The Woodrow Wilson House was constructed in 1915 in the Georgian Revival Style. President Wilson and his wife, Edith, moved in after his second term on March 4, 1921. Woodrow Wilson lived in this house until his death in 1924 and it stayed in Edith's possession until her death in 1961 when it was given to the National Trust of Historic Preservation.

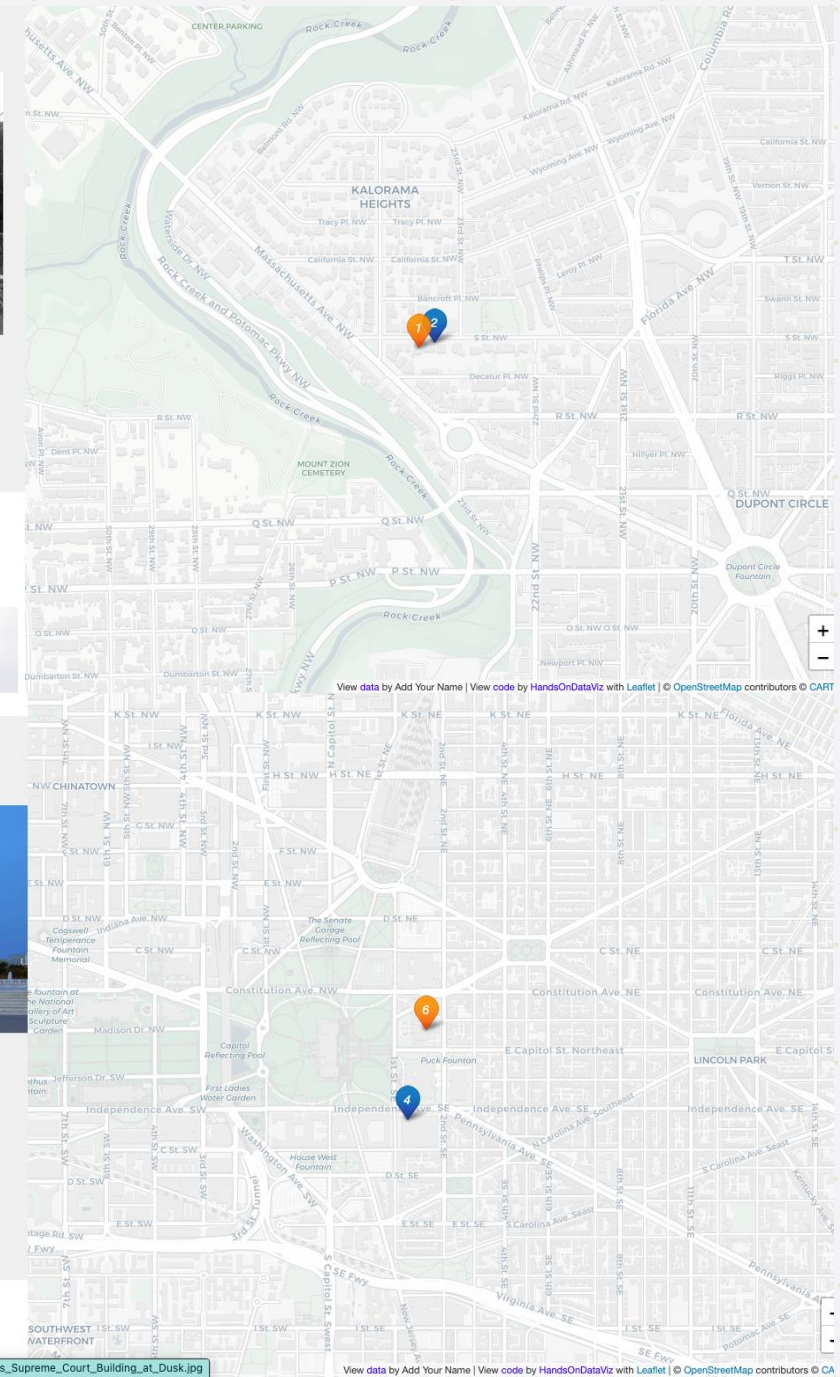


## The Supreme Court

Woodrow Wilson appointed three Associate Justices to the Supreme Court during his time in office: James Clark McReynolds, Louis Brandeis, and John Hessin Clarke. Justice McReynolds, who was formerly Wilson's Attorney General, betrayed Wilson's progressive agenda and was known for his staunch conservatism and bigotry throughout his reign on the court. Justice Brandeis was the first Jewish person appointed to the Supreme Court, a highly controversial appointment that garnered heavy Republican criticism. Justice Clarke had a relatively quiet career on the bench and was mostly known for supporting progressive ideals.
